One ham thing I can share is this: Trying new things almost always pays off. For example, you don't need to have a Master's Degree to download a free computer program and turn some audio tones into pictures on your computer. It's called Slow-Scan TV (SSTV) and it uses the sound card that's already in your computer.

N6RSL used the club's repeater recently and he sent me some pictures of his shack. They were

as clear as a bell! Really nice!

To receive and display SSTV, the free program and a simple wired connection from your radio to the computer are all you need. Do an Internet search for MMSSTV (my personal favorite) and see what pops up.

Later, you may want to send your own pictures. Add another simple connection from the computer back to the radio and you can be in business. The software handles both send and receive functions. Adding the wires is your job.

The Extra Class Question of the Day

As many of you already know, I have written study guides for the Tech and General Class license exams (www.kb6nu.com/tech-manual). Until now, however, I've shied away from writing an Extra Class study guide. The two main reasons for this is that the material is much more complicated and there's a lot more of it.

This year, however, the NCVEC is updating the Extra Class question pool, and I've decided to bite the bullet and do it. So, I'm now in the process of writing a No-Nonsense Extra Class Study Guide.

After I got started on this, I had a D'oh! moment. It occurred to me that instead of just publishing this material in the study guide, I could also post some of it to my blog (www.kb6nu.com). So, now I have the "Extra Class question of the Day" feature on KB6NU.Com.

In reality, it's usually more than just a single question because many of the questions are on the same topic. That's OK, though, because in reality, I don't post these every day. So, it all works out. Having said all that, here's an example. The correct answer to the question is in bold.

Extra Class question of the day: meteor scatter Amateur radio operators use many different ways to get signals from one spot to another. Perhaps one of the most interesting is meteor scatter propagation.

Meteor scatter propagation is possible because when a meteor strikes the Earth's atmosphere, a cylindrical region of free electrons is formed at **the E layer** of the ionosphere. (E3A08) **28 - 148 MHz** is the frequency range that is well suited for meteor-scatter communications. (E3A09)

Unfortunately, these ionization trails are relatively short-lived, so

to communicate via meteor scatter, you need to either be able to detect when these paths are available or be transmitting when the paths are available. **All of these choices are correct** when talking about good techniques for making meteor-scatter contacts (E3A10):

- 15 second timed transmission sequences with stations alternating based on location
- Use of high speed CW or digital modes
- Short transmission with rapidly repeated call signs and signal reports



Club members set up, operated and demonstrated amateur radio communications utilizing the Chula Vista Fire Department's emergency communications trailer. The two-day event was a great opportunity to promote SOBARS, ham radio and to exercise the installed radio equipment in the trailer and to communicate on the various bands including HF, 2-meters, 70 centimeters and 1.25 meters.

Tom Leonard, KJ6DPO, with the assistance of the Chula Vista Fire Department, pre-positioned the emergency communications trailer the day before the event, in the public parking lot adjacent to the Chula Vista Yacht Club. On the first morning of the event, club members were met with their first challenge: No electrical power! Members quickly met the challenge and fired up the onboard generator and switched over to emergency power. That was a sign of things to come as there was no shore power during the event due to an electrical malfunction in the parking lot area.

The public got a firsthand look at the operating stations in the trailer along with radio demonstrations and



Club Member Teaches Radio Merit Badge to Boy Scouts

During the Merit Badge Jamboree held on February 18, 2012, at the San Diego LDS East Stake Center in Linda Vista, I had the honor of assisting in teaching my first Radio Merit Badge class. Under the direction of ARRL San Diego Section Leader (Southwestern Division) and club member Steve Early, AD6VI, I conducted a four hour class on many aspects of amateur radio and touched on broadcast radio.

Twelve Boy Scouts completed the requirements of the Radio Merit Badge which included such topics as the difference between amateur and broadcast radio, two way communications, the electromagnetic spectrum, block and schematic diagrams, schematic symbols, the phonetic alphabet, the FCC and ITU, Q signals and many of the basics of ham radio. The scouts were also given information on studying for their Technician Class License and where to take the test and get more information. The final requirement met by the Scouts was a short QSO on 2 meters on a simplex frequency with other scouts under the supervision of myself and other licensed Boy Scouts as control operators.

Later in the afternoon, waiting for me in the mail, was a letter and card designating me a Radio Merit Badge Counselor with Boy Scouts of America. I plan on teaching the Radio Merit badge class at Scout Fair in April and to individual troops later on in the year.

Location: Escondido area (address will be provided later.)

Two-Day Amateur Extra License Class

Dates: Saturday, 02 June and 09 June, 2012.

Times: approximately 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM for class, 5:00 PM to about 7:00 PM for exam on the second day. (Class time includes short hourly breaks and a 45-60 minute lunch break.)

Location: Kearny Mesa area (address will be provided later)

Costs: The classes are free. The VEC Exam at the end of the day costs no more than \$15.

Eligibility: Anyone is eligible if they follow instructions to register and confirm.

Age limit: None. (contact us for teen and pre-teen considerations)

Those who register will receive detailed instructions and study materials to review before the day of the class.
